### **Goal setting Interviews**


Thank you for attending the goal setting interviews last week. If you were unable to make it, the teachers will be arranging an alternative time with you over the coming week.

# Enviroschools update

# **Queenstown Lakes District**



# Celebrating Enviroschools in Queenstown Lakes District in 2023

Schools in Queenstown Lakes District (QLD) continue to embrace the Enviroschool's kaupapa on their journey to creating resilient, sustainable communities. 2023 has been a year for connection and celebration for the Enviroschools programme with the Otago Enviroschools holding 21st celebrations in Queenstown in November.

Connections continue to be made through school hui and community engagements. Many schools are including the Enviroschool's kaupapa and sustainability into their school strategy and vision, so the Enviroschool's kaupapa becomes part of business as usual and integrated into daily practices and inquiry topics. The guiding principle of Te Ao Māori, valuing and honouring indigenous knowledge, is a key focus for many schools.

A big mihi to kaiako and ākonga for their on-going mahi of creating healthy, peaceful, and sustainable communities. In 2024 our Enviroschools facilitators will continue to focus on supporting schools their Enviroschools journey. This pānui summarises the 2023 highlights of the mahi from Tāhuna and Wānaka schools.

### **Empowered Students**

Students continue to engage and drive sustainability initiatives across the Queenstown Lakes District schools with support from their teachers and Enviroschools facilitators. This support enables students to really get their hands dirty and in doing so, see the results of their

sustainability initiatives. These have included school garden development, native plantings, recycling stations and running school envirogroups. Students at Mount Aspiring College took action through their Team Green - they took part in the Climate Action Strike, attended the Wānaka A&P show on behalf of the school, were involved in native plantings and setting up a recycling station at the school.



### Learning for Sustainability

Many of the QLD schools included sustainability and waste reduction initiatives when planning for their 2023 camps, with waste being monitored on school camps and reduction from year to year being encouraged. Remarkables Primary School integrated the Enviroschool's kaupapa into a Sustainable Design Course for year 7/8 students. They researched, designed, and built models of 'living landscape features' to increase the school's biodiversity. Predator control and monitoring remained a key focus for several schools with Glenorchy School focused on predator

trapping and protecting native flora and fauna as part of their wider learning. The schools drew on the experts from Southern Lakes Sanctuary- QLDC and DOC to help with predator





### Te Ao Māori

Te Ao Māori is embraced and honoured in QLD school communities. Engagement with Tangata Whenua continues to develop across many Enviroschools and the links to place and mana whenua continue to evolve. Te Reo is embedded in all classes and many schools visited marae during 2023. Hāwea Flat School took the opportunity of a new school build to create bilingual signage and Matariki celebrations are now a key part of schools' calendars with many schools having community celebrations and looking at plantings according to Maramataka.

#### Sustainable Communities

QLD schools embrace opportunities to engage with and assist external programmes that work to enhance their local environment. Queenstown Primary students used their local Horn creek for their water inquiry unit resulting in contacting the QLDC with ideas on how they could look after the creek. The students are doing regular water tests and litter removal, and with the help of QLDC have done some riparian planting along the creek. 200 Shotover Primary students volunteered autumn and spring native planting days. Trees for Survival have been working with the students and the Kōwhai graduate programme to learn

botanical drawing, scientific observations to identify species, and propagation of native plants.

#### Holistic Reflection

Personal and group reflection is an important part of the Action Learning Cycle. Reflection can help you to assess and celebrate your progress, change your practice, and plan what comes next for your school community. Students and staff at **Te Kura O Take Kārara** and **Wānaka Primary** both engaged in holistic reflection to consider the past, present, and future of their journey. Both kura were surprised at how much they do and how much learning is linked to their place and sustainability. The ownership of ākonga of the reflection process shows how committed and proud students are of their mahi.

#### Hui

As well as the two primary hui in term four, during 2023 a secondary hui was held where students got to think about leadership, collaboration, and sustainability as they created lunch for everyone. There was also a teacher hui looking at the holistic reflection process and how Enviroschools supports Te Mātaiaho.
